

Paul Soldner 1921-2011

On the morning of January 5th, the NCECA office received news from our friend Doug Casebeer of Anderson Ranch of the passing of Paul Soldner. Paul was not only an historically significant figure in



the rise of the studio movement in American Ceramics from the 1960's on, he was an ever present member of the NCECA community throughout its 45 year history. In 1989 Paul was recognized as an Honorary Member of the Council. Paul's accessibility as a person of warm, genuine and creative energy made an incalculable impact on the lives of artists, students and collectors throughout the world. We are all saddened by his loss from our lives. An observance of Paul's memory will be planned for the upcoming NCECA conference in Tampa/St. Pete, and Anderson Ranch is planning a celebration of Paul's life to take place in June 2011in Aspen.

POTTER'S TIPS

To fill in carved lines with stain or oxide, try applying the stain neatly into the line with a hollow needle attached to a slip trailer. (These needles may be available at veterinary medical supply places.) Or you can use regular-sized insulin needles filled with stain. It takes a bit of practice to release the syringe at an even rate and not jab the clay!

If you have ever tried decorating with a brush on top of glaze, you know how quickly the glaze will absorb the liquid from the brush and how hard it is to get a long flowing line. Try adding glycerin to your stain, oxide or glaze. It will not affect the colour ~ just add enough to get a long flowing line.

Use a foam brush when applying wax to the bottom of pots. You won't get those threads of wax from stray bristles.

Protect your eyesight when peeping into your gas or electric kiln. Instead of looking directly into the firing chamber, use a small mirror and position it in such a manner that you can see inside through the peep-hole of the kiln by looking into the mirror.

BRUSHES.....A dime store brush will produce dime store results.

- Having a camel-hair brush does not mean it came from a camel. It refers to the soft type of hair used in making the brush. Squirrel is the finest.
- Dip your brush into dishwashing liquid before using liquid latex. As soon as you have finished, wash out immediately. Otherwise the latex will dry and be very hard to remove.
- Never wet a brush before applying metallics, lustres or mother-of-pearl.
- Brushes will last longer if you hang them upside down after washing.

Crazing Happens

Clay and glaze both expand in heat . . . knowing how much can't be beat.

How much they expand they also contract, by the same rate is a general fact.

If glaze contracts more than the clay, after it cools the glaze might craze.

If the clay shrinks more than the glaze, the glaze shivers and crawls in the cooling phase.

If the clay shrinks more than the glaze, the glaze shivers and crawls in the cooling phase. Matching clay and glaze to shrink near the same . . . that is our goal.
That is our aim.

Alkali oxides are really a hit, but be careful of how they make your glaze fit.

Soda and potash are really great,

but they have the highest

expansion rates.

Lithium is odd, it expands with heat, but doesn't contract. Isn't that neat?

Silica too

has low expansion . . . as an anti-craze ingredient there is no comparison.

Some like crazing while some do not, but it stresses the clay throughout the pot.

Easy to chip, absorbs water too . . . these are some defects crazing brings to you.

SMOKELESS WOOD KILN WORKSHOP - in HUNGARY July 1 – July 21

The International Ceramics Studio, Kecskemét (ICS) has been established here in Hungary for over 30 years now and is one of the worlds leading ceramic art centres. Potters, ceramists and artists come here to work on their own individual projects or as part of one of our organised themed programs. In pursuit of a greener studio practice, the International Ceramics Studio is hosting a Smokeless Wood Kiln Workshop to construct an efficient and sustainable wood-firing kiln with the world famous kiln designer and builder, **Masakazu Kusakabe**.

In the summer of 2010 we staged a successful wood-firing symposium under the direction of the Master Potter, Masakazu Kusakabe. In 2011 he will return to Kecskemét to lead this three week kiln building workshop in July.

Kusakabe sensei is a versatile artist: potter, kiln builder, sumi drawer and astronomer. His pioneering invention is the eco-friendly "smokeless kiln", which allows artists to build wood-firing kilns in built-up locations because it produces very little or no smoke.

He is the co-author of "Japanese Wood-Fired Ceramics", Krause Publications, 2005.

The program starts on the 1st July to 21st July and there is also time available after it to perform more firings in the new smokeless kiln. The program will run if there are enough applicants. (minimum 8 persons).

Costs are 260,000 Hungarian forints for the three week workshop. The cost includes accommodation in a single room (self catering), tuition, design notes and building plans, plus your work in two firings of the new kiln. Material costs are not included.

Application deadline is 1st April.

In Kecskemét we have comfortable ceramic studios and on site accommodation in single bedrooms (provided with bedding, pillows, blankets, towels etc.). The accommodation is self catering and we have large modern kitchens for preparing meals and lounges for socialising. Artists have full 24 hour access to their studios.

Italian Clays in a Japanese Snake Kiln May 9th to May 28th Umbria Italy.

Claywork, kiln building & Firing - 3 week workshop with **Kouichi Ohara** from Tokoname, Japan

Wood firing is the focus, the place is an old farm house by the forest, in Umbria, central Italy, where I live, 30 km north of Orvieto, just half way between Rome and Florence. There will be time to also visit ceramic villages and towns in this area, walking, hotspringing, having good food and good wine!

Cost of the workshop (including your stay, simple italian meals, materials, firing) is 900 euro per person; if you want to stay 2 weeks only, you may come just for the last two weeks, bringing your pieces to fire, or ... just working hard, it is 700 euro, plus clay cost.

We will host you for free, in a simple way (no need of a sleeping bag). If you want there's a B&B at 5 minutes walk (40 euros a room for 1 person; 25 euros per person when in double room).

This workshop will be possible when about 8 people would join it, so that it's possible to pay Ohara's flights, his wage, and materialsand food of course!
