December's Meeting – Show & Tell

The show and tell session at the December meeting was chaired by Muriel.

Members had brought some very impressive pieces. As interesting as the pieces, were the stories behind them.

Fern presented one of her pressings, that is clay pushed into a mold, fired and finished. Fern used oxides and shoe polish for highlighting.

Tobias brought some Emily Carr inspired pots, acquired at Kilshaw's Auction. Emily Carr used local clay and fired it in a brick kiln. Typical designs were influenced by native art, i.e. the raven and totem poles.

Linda showed a brown plate with a crawl glaze down the centre.

Betty B. had come up with a new Christmas tree design. The hand built trees were free standing with a white glaze. According to Betty they sold like hot cakes!

Priska showed her new design - signs of the zodiac - on cups. Another lovely idea!

Elaine had brought some of her bowls.

Alice had a raku bowl by Maja with a black and white glaze, which included nails. Amazing what people come up with! **Paige** introduced another technique - "fabric" decals and stamps on a white mug.

Libby Wray had brought samples from her new kiln and studio. She uses blueish glazes, sprayed on bisque.

Derek showed a bowl by Cathy, which he found in Toronto. The design resembled ancient Greek pottery. The brown glaze was Barnard's black plus Mason stains.

Pam T-W. had traveled to Mexico, where she found a stunning vase with an intricate "cut" design. The clay is used "as is", hand built without a wheel, burnished and pit fired.

Heidi produced some examples from the Sandra Dolph workshop in October, which was a lot of fun. Everybody came up with original ideas. Although we all listened to the same instructions, the results were quite unique.

Muriel showed one of her pieces, "Dancing Turtle", from her recent show at the Martin Bachelor gallery. She talked about the booklet, she produced with the help of friends. A lovely idea, which gave more insight into her art and accompanying stories.

Thanks to all presenters for a most inspiring glimpse into the world of clay.

He writes about his potting world:

"I'm what is known as a "mudder" among my fellow potters.

I like to tinker with glaze ingredients as the "chemists" do, searching for the perfect formula. And at a raku session, I can get as giddy as any "pyro" around the fire. But what really keeps me coming back to pottery is getting my hands in the mud and exploring what the clay can do.

Most of my work is wheel-thrown, sometimes with hand-built elements. I like to alter the symmetry created by the wheel by manipulating the form in different ways. Sometimes I stretch out pots from the inside to create surprising new surfaces. I also use many small tools—wooden spoons, old bread knives, cheese cutters, twisty wires—to paddle, dart, indent, slice, serrate, and facet my pieces.

I'm inspired by textures, shapes, and lines I see in the natural and industrial world, and I bring these





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ideas into my studio. When I am glazing my pots, I often layer the textured surfaces with clay engobes, metallic oxides, and glazes. I participate in raku firings once or twice a year; however, I fire most of my pieces to 1240 C in my 12-cubic-foot electric kiln. I re-fire some pots a number of times to get the result I want.

I made my first pot in a beginner's class in 1975, igniting a lifelong passion for pottery. In 1980 I was profoundly influenced by a month-long workshop with Wayne Ngan, which left me with a deep and lasting appreciation for the traditions of Chinese and Japanese pottery. Much of my development over the past 30 years has been self-directed through voracious reading of pottery books and magazines and liberal experimentation in my studio. For me, the real joy of the craft comes not from producing a "perfect" pot but from true engagement in the act of creating the work."

Your Website

Read, Review and Revise - go through your entire website and take a good look at images and information.

the basics:

- update copyright to 2013
- remove outdated material including images and information
- add new material (older images etc. can be moved to an archive section)
- review what you are saying on the website has anything changed, have you changed?
- does your headshot and "about" need changing?
- do you have a list of dates and info for any shows or sales you are involved in? Post as soon as you get them.
- overall, does the site still reflect you and your philosophy? Is it time for a new look?

A caution: always keep a safe record of who your hosting company is and what your renewal dates are. Keep all your contact information up to date. The same goes for your domain name. Sometimes domain names are included with your hosting package. Sometimes they are separate. Educate yourself on this - the past year I have had clients receive official looking but fake mailings (snail mail and email) requesting payments for "renewals" on their domain names. If in doubt, consult your hosting company. Most have an automated system for renewal which can be the safest route - especially if you are forgetful. How would these companies know who you are and how to contact you? Most info is on public record unless you pay a little extra for "privacy". Try checking out your domain name at a "whois" site like http://www.whois.com/whois/

Business

If you are selling your work, review how you are doing it. Your website is the starting point to let people know what you are doing, show off your work etc. If you don't have a website then consider a simple brochure that gives an overview of you and your work and always have business cards with contact information to hand out at any events you participate in.

If you don't sell your work, is this the year to try it? Do some research, talk to other people in the same field. Do they sell online? How do they collect payments? How do they ship? What are some good local shows or galleries to research? For inspiration, surf the web and see how others are presenting their work. For a different kind of experience visit etsy.com, a whole village of craftspeople selling their work.

Your Art

Is this the year to try a different technique? To perfect a certain style or glaze recipe? Is this the year to approach galleries? to enter shows? Is this the year to challenge yourself to make 1, 5, 25 pots a day? Is this the year to take a class to learn something different, to be inspired? Check out classes and workshops - MISSA comes to mind, but there are a lot more learning opportunities out there including getting together with other creative types to share and discuss creative process, technique, selling your work etc.

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
