



Do you have a website? If yes, are you keeping it up to date and making use of its many possibilities?

If no, are you ready for a website?

Websites can serve different needs. They allow you to share your work and communicate with other potters, artists, teachers and buyers. By putting your name, studio name, images and information on the internet you are visible and can be found. Being found has potential for sales, gallery connections etc. A web presence also works as a kind of resume - it establishes you as an active working potter/artist. (see note below)

Website creation is somewhat simpler than it was a few years ago. There are a number of website builders available for little or no cost such as WordPress at wordpress.com and Weebly at weebly.com to name a few.

WordPress is a relatively easy to use website system and one of the most popular and expandable. You can use WordPress for free (visit wordpress.com to read about it) or you can host and customize a WordPress site by purchasing hosting and a domain name with a company like BlueHost or HostPapa that is WordPress compatible. When hosting WordPress on your own,

it is installed onto your site via your site's cpanel. For more information on this approach visit wordpress.org. You can pick a free theme or pay for a expanded theme, customize and build your presence on the web. The additional expense of hosting and a domain name are best if you want your personalized domain name, have a large content heavy site or have multiple sites. If you're not sure you are ready to be on the web consider a trial period on wordpress.com. There you can experience the process of having a site and working with WordPress and various themes.

You can customize your site simply by creating a header (or by having one created for you) that includes an image or composite images of your work. Or use a special font, drawings or photos of your studio to create a personalized header. Some of these elements can also be incorporated as part of your website for a coordinated custom look.

Not ready for a website? Take advantage of your guild membership. As a member you can have a page with 3 to 5 photos of your work, bio, artist statement and contact information. For some examples visit http://www.victoriapotters.ca/member-profiles

Note: Deb didn't mention the two primary reasons my website is crucial to my life as a potter. Most importantly, it acts as my catalogue and record of my work. I make pots in a single-car garage and have no room to display them. As a pot is finished its numbered, photographed for the site then packed in a box so I can find and retrieve it. My site is linked to a database. Though I update the site by removing pots as I sell them, the database provides a permanent record. Secondly, over the years I've collected clients throughout Western Canada. My website allows me to stay in touch with these folks. I'm a mud-slinger, not a computer person but find I can quite easily maintain my site. Editor

Are your pots cracking? Handles coming off? Betty B. may have found you help!

PAPER CLAY......This stuff makes miracles happen. You may fill cracks you thought would never heal, even on bisque and you might even be able to repair and re-glaze in one step. Paste a mixture of your own clay as a slip and toilet paper, 2 to 1, blend and push into crack. Re-fire the piece.

LANA WILSON's MAGIC WATER......She says, "I use this instead of slip."

1 gallon water, 3 tbsp. liquid sodium silicate (also called water glass or egg keep), 1 1/2 tsp. soda ash.

LANA's PAPER CLAY: "The best mending for cracks or holes on green or bisque that I have EVER seen is paper clay. I also use it as slip when attaching leather-hard pieces for boxes or drawers".

Use about 1/4 to 1/3 volume of paper linter or toilet paper to 3/4 or 2/3 bone dry clay. Soak the paper and clay overnight in Magic Water (or plain water). The water should be about one inch above clay and paper. I find mixing with a hand-held mixer (like a Braun) is easiest but a blender also works well. Pour off extra water. "I have two jars of this paper clay in my studio. One is slip consistency for attaching. The other jar is soft clay consistency which I use to solve cracks."

SPOOZE......This recipe uses your own dried clay trimmings. Start with Lana's Magic Water. Add sufficient toilet paper and clay to make a mass thick enough for your purposes......sometimes quite stiff, other times "gushy". If too "gushy" it can be stiffened with a bit of vinegar or a drop or two of sodium silicate. Refrigerate it to prevent it from smelling. Or add a little peroxide or bleach.

PATRICK HORSELY'S "SCORE NO MORE" SLIP & REPAIR PASTE

1000 grams of your clay body in dry form

20 grams Custer feldspar

20 grams Bentonite

20 grams Gum Arabic

1 tsp. liquid Darvan

It is important to disperse the Gum Arabic. Pour boiling water over and add water up to a slip consistency. A blender really helps. Then add liquid Darvan when it is well mixed. Add a tiny bit of bleach to keep odors down.

Poem of the Month - Ratios: A Juggling Act

Three components will make a glaze.

We can juggle their ratios

in so many ways.

Silca, alumnina add some flux too . . . it's all in the ratios as to what they will do.

Juggle their ratios.
What does that mean?
Each glaze is different.
Which one is your dream?

Ratios affect quite a few factors. It really depends on the glaze that you're after.

Glossy or matte, low, mid or high fire – find the right ratio for the glaze you desire. Glaze fit and color, stability too,

the ratios determine what each glaze will do.

All of these factors

require different amounts.

Juggling the ratios is tantamount.

Raising the alumina by increasing the clay will create a matte glaze . . . but that's only one way!

Excess alkaline earth flux can make it turn matte –

do cool it slowly if you like that!

So excess calcia strontia too, magnesia or baria can bring matte to you.

Very low silica also will matte.

But if it's for food surfaces, please don't do that!

If sculpture is your kind of clay, tweaking a glaze can make your day.

But if dinnerware is what you do best, stable and craze-free are glazes to test.

It's all in the ratios

of three main components – you too can become a juggling proponent.




