MEG BURGESS...A PASSION FOR CLAY



one look at Meg's pieces would tell you that she is in control of a great deal of her work. So how does she reconcile those seemingly opposing ideas?

For starters, Meg has used a sketchbook all her working life as an aide-memoire. She jots down thoughts, words and sketches images that arise from daily life and make an impression at the moment. Many such small moments may be lost when one comes to the studio days later, so a sketchbook can re-stimulate the creative impulse.

Meg says that working in series helps her to find her

Meg Burgess began her fine arts education at the High School of Art in Manchester, continued in London at The Camberwell School of Art, and went on to master classes in Stoke on Trent. She opened her first studio in Wales and after nine years, emigrated to Canada. Meg currently lives and works in Comox, and has been very involved with **Fired Up** since it's inception twenty-four years ago.

"Your work is in the lap of the gods," says Meg Burgess. This idea resonated through much of Meg Burgess's presentation to the Guild on March 10. If that seems to imply that we have no control over our work,

own way. By starting out with an idea and repeating it, she subtly changes each successive edition, refining and developing the initial form and finish until she feels that it expresses what she is aiming for.

That her glazes and forms fit so wonderfully together is the result of this very methodical approach. She tests glazes continuously and advises us to test new formulae regularly, and to keep detailed notes. In all these ways Meg does everything in her power to get the results she originally envisioned.

With so many elements under control, the kiln must be the lap of the gods –where we release our work to the whim of the fire. She, as do many of us, finds that moment of peering into the kiln a high point on the journey. We see what the gods will allow us at that moment. Particularly exciting to her is seeing her work fired in Gordon Hutchen's anagama kiln on Denman Island.


Meg showed us a variety of pieces including pierced dishes, and small bowls. Pierced dishes offer many technical challenges to overcome, such as cracking, sagging, and surface smoothness. Meg uses her strong drawing skills, a special flexible scalpel and lots of patience.(she allows about 2 hours to carve these fine pieces) When things go wrong she advises us not to try to fix them, but consign them to the recycle bin and move on. The




successful pieces demonstrate her skill, patience and control over the glaze, yet also acceptance and appreciation of the special results that are a happy accident of the dipping process.

Her closed forms receive a variety of glazes including tenmoku. She applies wax resist to the glaze surface often using a leaf motif. Meg particularly enjoys brushwork and her pieces really show her expertise. A pale creamy coloured glaze is then applied to the decorated area. Meg fires a gas kiln, in reduction, to cone 10 (half down). The results are stunning.

The question of pricing her work came up and Meg replied that she has difficulties with this



Throughout her presentation Meg communicated her love of her work and her warm, human approach to issues and problems. Meg Burgess truly has a passion for clay. It was a privilege and inspiration to see her work and hear her comments.

Two new books:


Craft, Perception and Practice Vol 111 A Canadian discourse


edited by Paula Gustafson, Nisse Gustafson & Amy Gogarty

This is a study of Canadian craft - ceramics, weaving, metal, glass, etc. The compilation of writings is complimented with superb images of work by Canadian craft artists.

I have randomly read a few essays and have spun off on reflecting on the role of pottery specifically. For example how hand crafted bowls have become Souper Bowls. Do read the last three page tribute to Paul Gustafson, a potter and the editor who died before completing this volume that she inspired. "In Memoriam" is written by her daughter.

Taking time from the practice of creating pots is a luxury. Exploring perspectives in this book is just that. Indulge in expanding the role of our clay art and read some of the essays in this book.





Utopic Impulses, Contemporary Ceramics Practice edited by Ruth Chambers, Amy Gogarty & Mireille Perron

Compared to the size of the pots we make, there are some big and expanding ideas for thought on the role of ceramics as a socially responsible practice.

There are ten critical essays and twenty artist projects presented in this Canadian book, all about ceramics, complemented with colour photos throughout. I really enjoyed reading "The Medalta Potteries Project". It made me think of Stella Meades' 1000 raku shoes and the resultant FOOTSTEPS: A GLOBAL RESPONSE display in Victoria, February this year. The intent was to be a statement of hope about children in war.

The editors offer this collection about thought and practice "in the hope that they will inspire others to recognize the utopic potential" of craft practices and creative endeavours.

Both books have inspiring ideas to keep one's heed "spinning" while one's hands are in tune with the spinning of the clay on the wheel.


Scattered Artists Studio Tour
