### **October Program in Review:**

Three guild members -Louise Bouchard, Libby Wray and Monika Burrell - each gave an overview of how they have used alternative surfaces (oxide washes, burnishing, sodium silicate, burnished and unburnished raku) to showcase texture.



Louise described how she highlights the raw outside texture of her pots (with a combination of oxides and the remnants of a bit of glaze for sheen) and combines with the high contrast of a complex interior glaze which

sometimes features melted glass for

pools of eye popping colour.



Libby showed a variety of different treatments including naked raku, a hand built house (vet clinic) complete with flowers on high heat wire as well as the figure of a raku fired woman vessel finished with horsehair and ferrous oxide for colour.

Monika shared her fish heads done in a brilliant red iron terra sigillata.







#### **Norm Bauer**

Meet Norm Bauer, one of the newest members of our guild, joining along with his wife Tina at the September meeting. Norm's clay journey started with his first exposure to clay through his mom's work -quild member Marlene Bauer. Norm and Tina regularly attended craft fairs along with Marlene first at her craft tables and then with their own table as Tina started her own craft business of catnip sales. Then, Mom gifted Norm and Tina a pottery course at Juan de Fuca and from there the journey continued. The pottery course led to Tina creating pots to sell with her catnip plants (check out Missy's Catnip on Facebook). Norm, as well as enjoying family time playing with clay, was finding clay to be the perfect medium for building small outbuildings to go with his miniature fantasy characters he paints for war games. He had become a dab hand at painting these characters and clay work allowed him to take his efforts to the next level. As well, Norm enjoyed hand building bowls, finding the wheel not the best for his back.





After meeting many potters through his Mom and the



world of craft fairs, Norm decided his next step was to join the guild as he loved the friendly potters he was meeting at the craft

fairs. Since joining, Norm has been 'blown away', by what he's learned from the meetings.

As time permits from his day job (he's a system's administrator managing computer networks with the Strathcona Hotel) and his busy life with craft sales, he wants to explore more about glazing and making marks on clay with found objects— such as the fellow he met that uses door knobs to make beautifully detailed impressions. Norm said that his eyes were opened by the October program to the science and language of glazing, something that he didn't know was part of the world of clay. Norm is particularly enjoying the non-competitive and sharing nature of potters and enjoying the encouragement he and Tina have received.

#### Joy Finlay

Meet Joy Finlay - long-time potter, guild member and, in partnership with her husband Cam, an award winning naturalist and author as well.

One only has to see Joy's crinkle pots to know that her heart and soul are closely connected to this earth, but you might miss the extent of Joy's wide ranging knowledge and expertise of the natural world – it goes beyond the ferns and leafs that grace her pots.

Joy and Cam both hold the Order of Canada for their work



as naturalists and numerous other awards from various provinces including the Order of Big Horn, the Pimlott Award, both Queen's medals and the BC Nature Award for outstanding naturalist (Ian McTaggart-Cowan Award) to list a few.



Joy's early working career was in social work, but it wasn't long before her leadership as an urban naturalist morphed into a new full time career developing environmental outdoor education programs for school boards and teaching at university. Her career grew exponentially with speaking

engagements and nature walks around her then home province of Alberta and included publishing a number of articles and books. Joy has much to share in this area and I encourage you to ask her how she made nature accessible in the winter for her own children - snowsuits out of old suits and homemade snowshoes and little huts with wood burning stoves.

In the midst of this busy career combined with a busy family life, Joy's daughter suggested a course in pottery and from there Joy's journey in clay took off. Joy recalls that she knew once her hands touched the clay it would be a full on exploration of this new frontier. It did demand a fair bit of her time, but it also gave her respite – her 'day job' included extensive dialogue and working with people – rich but exhausting – clay on the other hand did not talk back. With the support of Cam and his numerous Christmas presents of wheels, kilns, extruders and slab rollers, Joy's clay journey jogged along apace her other work. A neighbour who was an electrician as well as an artist, both rewired the house to accommodate the kiln and took Joy's pots to shows when her time was otherwise committed.

Since 'retiring' to Saanich, Joy has continued her potting career as well as staying active as a naturalist and author. She spent a number of years volunteering with Cedar Hill Recreation Centre studio as the glaze mixer and for more than ten years, along with Heidi Roemer, set up an annual country studio tour. These tours were great fun as they always included an added attraction to coax visitors out to the 'country'. The attractions included Cam's hummingbird banding, ikebana demonstrations, book signings by our other author Rosemary Neering and a very popular artisan baker. Joy has been involved in the Guild from its early days, as a maker of bowls for Souper Bowls of Hope and for a long stint as the librarian after Rachel Coward. That job included her canvasing thrift stores for the right kind of trolleys to store the books and wheel them out at meetings. Joy is very gratified to see that the guild continues to be vital and loves the energy new members are bringing with them. She particularly likes the discussions that centre on the work of the members. Her advice is to never question whether you are 'good enough' to join the guild, participate in the discussions or participate at the annual sale or take a class at MISSA – that wherever you are in your clay journey, your contributions and participation are key to the success of us all.

Ceramics travel guru Denys James talks about his travels, his travel offerings and his own ceramics.


#### **February: Tips and Tools**
